

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Pastor's Thoughts

January 2014

As most of you know, I have never been silent about my expectation to retire in the near future. This is to let you know that I have written to Bishop Webb asking to retire on July 1, 2014. After 37 years of ministry it's time to step aside and let others carry on the work. I will be returning to Oswego, NY where I grew up, and there renew acquaintances and hopefully complete some scripts and another book.

I have been going through my files and have been reminded of how much I've written over the years—plays (full-length and one acts), short stories, essays, poems and special worship services. Combine that with nearly 2000 sermons, there's a great deal of sorting to do. I have followed John Wesley's advice about not keeping sermons. He said keep only the last seven years because in that length of time you grow and change so much that anything older is not worth saving. I'll do one better, and not save any of them!

Unlike some other clergy, I don't repeat sermons and I don't keep a card file of quotes and illustrations, so in that regard there's nothing to save. Every sermon I've written was for the moment and so I wouldn't feel worthy of preserving. Perhaps I'll put together a three year cycle of Sunday meditations combining all the best thoughts (that I can remember) and explore publication; time will tell.

As we all move through this period of transition, we will do so with a sense of urgency about what we will all need to have in place for the next phase of life - both personal and for the church.

You need to know the Staff-Pastor Parish Relations Committee has been and will continue to work on your behalf with the District Superintendent to see that the Dryden United Methodist Church is well cared for. In the interim we will continue to work together to fulfill ministry in all its varied forms so that God's work can go on with enthusiasm and an honest commitment of service to all.

OUTREACH COMMITTEE - 2013

The Outreach Committee of the Dryden United Methodist Church had another successful year with their outreach missions.

Our continued involvement in the on-going mission work with the monthly dinners for the community and our Haiti student sponsorships and lunch program are still very strong with the congregation. The Dryden United Methodist Church sponsors two dinners a month. With the help of two other local churches, the church has four dinners each month. On average, we serve over 65 community members a week. We are seeing our numbers increase this year. The need is great! In Haiti, we currently sponsor one high school student and one medical school student as a congregation, with several individual congregants sponsoring their own students. We still donate \$1000 a year to the lunch program at the Mitzpah School. Some of that money comes from the weekly can and bottle donations.

This year in January, we held a dessert auction which raised approximately \$1000. We divided the funds between African University (\$500) and Hurricane Sandy victims.

During Lent, approximately \$250 was collected for "ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING".

This Spring, we collected supplies and packed 25 health kits and 25 school kits for Church World Service.

In May, we held our annually rummage sale and raised over \$1600 for our mission projects.

In June for Father's Day, we raised over \$325 for Blanket Sunday.

Over the Summer, banks were distributed to collect funds for our local school chairity, "HANDS" (Help a Needy Dryden Student). We also donated \$100 to our churchs' quilter's group (My Brother's Keeper) who make sleeping bags for the homeless.

October always brings the DRYDEN CROP WALK. This year we raised over \$1000 with 25% of funds staying in the community for our food cupboards. Our church continually provides food and funds for the Dryden Kitchen Cupboard which serves the Dryden community and the Web program that feeds our school children during the weekends and holidays. Also in October of this year, in order to help out an elderly couple that was moving to another state, we held a moving sale. The proceeds of over \$1800 were donated by the couple to the outreach missions.

In December, "THE ANGEL TREE" is always a successful mission. We collect \$10 for every angel that is put on our Christmas tree and then use those funds to buy food, clothing and toys for approximately 12 children in our community that otherwise would have a bleak Christmas. Last year, we raised over \$1600.

The success of the outreach programs in our church are because of a loving and giving congregation!

WEB PROGRAM



During the month of November our church collected 46 cans of canned pasta. Thank you for your generosity which allows 60 children at risk for hunger to have nutritious food over the

week-end.

We will be collecting jars of peanut butter (approximately 15-16 oz.) in January. We continue to purchase shelf stable milk. Children receive a quart once every 4 weeks along with hot cocoa, instant breakfast drink and instant oatmeal. The other weeks they receive a single serving box. Our milk bill is about \$350 per month. Monetary donations may be made to Dryden Kitchen Cupboard earmarked WEB.

Thank you for your support and prayers. You are making a difference in the lives of many children




PLEDGE CARDS FOR 2014


TRUSTEE MEETING

YEAR END CAPITAL FUND REPORT

(While this report only takes the Capital Fund through to December 1st, it gives you an indication of how well everyone is doing.)

Anticipated pledge receipts for 2013 were \$41,714.33, with all but \$3389.33 received by December 1st. Some people pay monthly and we expect that by the end of the year to have received all of the money pledged.

We have received from one-time gifts, \$70, 283! That includes money from members of the church, community members and local businesses. That amount can increase at any time funds are received that are not pledge dollars.

Congregational loans have amounted to \$25,000. These will need to be paid backwith interest in the future.

A total of \$52,015.92 was transferred from several trustee accounts (Little and Havington bequests) for work on the Rose Window and for general contract work. With the \$100.32 in interest, that means we have had available \$185,724.24 for current and future work.

We have paid out \$114,077.03 to Jeff Horton for work done to date. He will complete work under the terms of the contract in the Spring. Another \$18,950 has been paid to Durr Studios for work on the Rose Window. An additional \$22,650 will be paid next year when restoration of the window is complete. There has been \$264.76 paid out for mailings, etc. related to the Capital Fund, for a total expenditure in 2013 of \$133,291.79 leaving a current balance in the account of \$52,432.45

If everyone who had made a three-year pledge to the Capital Fund fulfills their obligation in 2014 we anticipate receiving another \$38,550.33; in 2015, \$31,050.32 and in 2016 \$1835.00. That will bring the total of receipts to \$260,549.23, with \$25,000 of that to be repaid in loans, plus interest.


The Trustees continue to discuss future needs for the maintenance of the church building.
